Camry exceeded all expectations and became so popular that a manufacturing plant opened in the U.S. in Georgetown, Kentucky in 1988. After the first American made Camry showed up in the dealership showrooms across the nation, the rest was history. In 1989, just as the interior and overall size of the Camry grew, so did sales. In 1997, the Camry officially became America's best-selling car, and remains so to date.

Since 1983, the Camry has undergone many changes and its exterior has evolved from "plain Jane" to the sleek, sophisticated model that it is today. Even in that day, the impressive motor touted a generous 92 horsepower. In 2007 when styling was completely overhauled, it offered the optional 3.5-liter V6 that produced a whopping 268 horsepower and 248 lb-ft of torque while returning 28 mpg on the highway.

The 2012 Camry offers two different engines. The 4-cylinder offers 178 horsepower and an EPA-estimated 35 mpg on the highway. The V6 offers 268 horsepower and 30 mpg on the highway. Both engines also join a six-speed automatic transmission to deliver better fuel economy. Wow—a Camry with 268 horsepower under its hood: not too shabby for a midsize family car.

The Camry's interior has always had the reputation of being quiet, even under higher speeds. Performance from behind the wheel is known for comfort and ease of handling. With proper maintenance, the Camry is well known for being mechanically stable for the

life of the vehicle. All the creature comforts are there, along with a roomier interior. Worry—purchasing a Camry is truly the one major thing in your life you will never second-guess or worry about. It's one of those purchases that allows you to drive it home, and actually lie down and sleep at night without worrying about how you spent your money.
